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# Esther 4:14 - ... for such a time as this...

When this whole thing started, I suspect we were all thinking we would be coming up with new ways to get through this time until life got back to normal. When we closed the church office, we thought it would be for a couple of weeks. It was impossible to think of our not being together as a community to celebrate Easter.

I don't know about anyone else, but without looking at a calendar I find it hard to remember when this all started. Changes have been coming so quickly, it took time before we realized we were not exempt from the reality of living with a pandemic threat.

By now we know this is not just 'get through a week or two' time. Like it or not, this appears to be our new normal for an unknown amount of time. The Presbytery office tells us to plan on being out of the church through the month of April, but that too may be overly optimistic.

We are all learning new things, new ways to connect, to do school and work as best we can. People are getting creative in how they stay connected, having drive-by visits with family and Zoom dinners or even game nights with friends using video conference calls. People stuck at home are finding all kinds of ways to share their talents: concerts with singers and instrumentalists participating from their own living rooms, exercise videos to use while stuck inside, recipe sharing or tutorials on endless projects you could tackle while at home. Others make us laugh: Debbie Stubbs shared a link of nuns (in full habit), singing a Covid-19 version of "The Gambler"!

At Calvin Church we add spiritual practices during the season of Lent. We cannot gather for Wednesday evening services, but we can take some of the time that seems to go slowly just now and spend it in prayer (for family, friends, for our health care workers, first responders...). Spend time in meditation, in reading Scripture, singing hymns. Go outside and be in God's creation in all its spring glory. Reflect on what is important and what we are missing – friends, family, freedom to move around freely... Journal or record the blessings we **do** have, and make sure we tell the people who are significant in our lives just what they mean to us.

My prayer is for all of us to feel God's comfort and grace and strength for however long this time may last. Even in a time of social distancing and isolation, we are not alone. Reach out to others. Be gentle with yourself and with one another. And remember: you are loved and held in God's grace - and you are not alone!

Keep washing your hands – stay in touch – and stay connected to God!

# A LETTER FROM OUR PARISH ASSOCIATE

Dear Friends at Calvin Presbyterian Church,

"Why are you cast down, O my soul (our mind, will, and emotions), and why are you disquieted within me?

Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my salvation and my God." Psalm 42:5 "For you, O Lord, are my hope, my trust, O Lord, from my youth." Psalm 71:5 "My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth." Psalm 121:2

The Apostle Paul wrote in Philippians 1:3, 4 & 27, "I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy...Let your manner of life be worthy of the gospel of Christ, so that whether I come and see you or am absent, I may hear of you that you are standing firm in one spirit, with one mind striving side by side for the faith of the gospel."

"Social distancing" is what we need to do right now as our nation and world are afflicted with the coronavirus for which we have no medical defense yet. However, social distancing is not what a church is all about. A church has always been about "social connecting". The church is about relationships. First, your personal relationship with God through Christ Jesus, our Lord and Savior, then our relationship with other Christians; being in fellowship and communion with other members in the church, the Body of Christ. Being members of the Body of Christ, we are:

- the hands of Christ GIVING
- the feet of Christ GOING
- the eyes of Christ SEEING
- the ears of Christ LISTENING
- the mouth of Christ SPEAKING HIS WORD
- all directed by the Head of the Body, the Lord Jesus Christ.

How do we do this in this time of social distancing? The Apostle Paul gives us some clues, as he experienced social distancing all the time. He started churches all over Asia Minor and Greece and then had to leave them, always wondering how they were doing in his absence. We read in Paul's letters of the pain and emotional distress this caused him. He had no phone, no social media, no video chat, no text messaging. He did all he could do – write a letter, pray for the people in these distant churches, and wait months for a return letter.

What did Paul say in his letters? Words like this: "Stay firm in your faith, keep close to Christ, read and obey his Word and serve Him, using the gifts and talents and opportunities you have to live for Christ and serve Him in ways you can." In Romans 12:9-21 Paul summarizes it beautifully, including these words, "Serve the Lord, Rejoice in Hope, Be Patient in Tribulation, Be Constant in Prayer".

We need to be faithful to our Lord and use the abilities and opportunities God gives us to be a light for Christ and be a blessing to family, friends, and neighbors who are hurting from all the disruptions this pandemic is causing us. This could include: calling someone on the phone or connecting with other forms of instant communication, writing a note or letter (like Paul had to do), and being creative to find ways to encourage and support one another.

"Blest be the tie that binds, our hearts in Christian love; The fellowship of kindred minds is like to that above. Before our Father's throne, we pour our ardent prayers; our fears, our hopes, our aims are one, our comforts and our cares. We share our mutual woes, our mutual burdens bear; And often for each other flows, the sympathizing tear. When we asunder part, it gives us inward pain; But we shall still be joined in heart, and hope to meet again." Blest Be the Tie That Binds Hymn #438 (Presbyterian Hymnal)

#### The Three Days: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil

Ideas from the Presbyterian Church (USA) for worship, personal devotion, or online reflection: Maundy Thursday focuses on Jesus' service and love: how can we love and serve today? Good Friday features Jesus' outstretched arms: how can we embrace the world today? Easter Vigil tells the story of God's saving love: how will we remember, share the story?

#### Handwashing: A Spiritual Practice for Maundy Thursday

Prepare a pitcher of water, a bowl, and towels Prayerfully pour water over each hand (or allow a family member to do so) As you do so reflect on the grace and love of Jesus Christ poured out in your life Dry your hands (or those of family members) with a towel Conclude with this or a similar prayer:

O God, your love is embodied in Jesus Christ, who washed disciples' feet on the night of his betrayal. Wash us from the stain of sin, so that, in hours of danger, we may not fail, but follow your Son through every trial, and praise him always as Lord and Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen. (Book of Common Worship 276)

#### Prayer of Lament: A Spiritual Practice for Good Friday

Read Psalm 22, a psalm of lament Reflect on the state of the world, the church, and your own life Offer these things to God in prayer, seeking God's saving power Read, pray, or sing the psalm a second time Conclude with prayer

Eternal God, your Son cried out in anguish from the cross, and you delivered him. Do not hide your face from those who cry out to you. By his death and resurrection bring life where there is death: feed the hungry, strengthen the weak, and break the chains of oppression, that all people may rejoice in your saving deeds through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen. (Book of Common Worship 946)


Thanksgiving for Light: A Spiritual Practice for the Easter Vigil (Saturday evening of Holy Week)

Light a candle and read John 1:1-5

Reflect on and give thanks for times where you see God's light shining in darkness

Conclude with this or a similar prayer:

We praise and glorify you, Lord God, for Christ, our life, is risen and has conquered sin and death. He has broken the chains that bind us and freed us to live in his kingdom of light. May Christ enlighten the hearts of all who believe. May Christ transform this world that longs to see him, enlightening the hearts of all who believe, and restore all creation to its rightful place. Glory, praise, thanksgiving, and blessing to you, O God, victor over sin and death, now and forever. Amen. (Book of Common Worship 831)
