CHURCH UPDATE

A message from the Presbytery of the Twin Cities area regarding re-opening churches:

In the spirit of love, justice, and communal wholeness that grounds our faith, the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area reaffirms its strong recommendation to its churches to avoid most or all in-person gatherings in churches or other indoor spaces for the foreseeable future.

There has been much public conversation in the last days in Minnesota and Wisconsin about the viability of in-person gatherings for worship or Bible study. Though it sorrows us, evidence has borne out that gatherings of faith communities remain some of the most risky activities in this time of COVID-19. There is ample evidence that group gatherings indoors for lengthy periods of times (like worship or Bible study), gatherings in larger groups (even outdoors), or public singing (groups or solos), are high-risk practices. More fundamentally, however, there are the values and instructions of our Christian faith which tell us:

In our choices around community, to center the gifts and needs of the most vulnerable (1 Corinthians 12:21-22)

To not mistake what is "permissible" for what is good (I Corinthians 8:9)

To be patient in times of challenge (Romans 12:12)

We urge our congregations to follow the example of Jesus Christ in loving our neighbor as ourselves (Mark 12:31) and not risk the most vulnerable among us for the sake of "returning to normal."

As a presbytery, we are modeling this by having cancelled all our in-person large group events through the end of 2020, and will continually reevaluate throughout 2021.

We are also designing a discussion guide for congregational leaders and Sessions about the Christian values foundational to our ministries, to help our congregations continue to discern and deepen how they will do ministry together in this time.

There are powerful opportunities to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with God in this time, and spending our energy on doing those tasks mindfully and lovingly, rather than a return to the routine, is the core of our calling.

Pastor Carol's Corner

They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

- Acts 2:42-47

The beginning of the second chapter of Acts of the Apostles tells the story of the day of Pentecost. The Holy Spirit came upon the believers who until that time had been uncertain what to do after Jesus had left them. Everything had changed. No one knew what was to come.

Sound just a bit familiar? For us everything about how we do church seems to have changed. We do not know how long this current reality of physical distancing and long distance worship will last. People miss the fellowship time and significant events have had to be postponed. We long to return to life as normal.

By the end of the second chapter in Acts we read that the believers had found a sense of purpose in worship, teaching and mission. The passage mentions the numbers who were being added to their ranks, but I don't really think that head count was what mattered. It would be a long time before people became organized as the church with a building and staff. They would need to depend on God and one another.

In the midst of this unprecedented time, we are **still** the church. We may not be seated together in the sanctuary, but we are still called to worship and pray, to serve those in need and to praise God together. I pray that this time of uncertainty and change will be a time for us to be touched by the Spirit and strengthened in faith.

Spirit of God, filling our hearts with hope, steadying our nerves with peace, comforting our lives with love ...

Spirit of God, come to us now — surging through the darkness of our lives, sweeping over our weariness —so that, in this time of Pentecost, the sparkling light of faith, the rushing wind of hope and the joyful sound of praise may echo round the world, may echo in the church, and find their response in us. AMEN

On Memorial Day, George Funk displayed an 1861, 31-star US flag at their home. The flag is huge, measuring 16' x 8' and very fragile. George's great-great-great grandma made the flag in 1861, along with her Akron, Ohio quilting club, to send troops off from Akron. There was no directive at the time of proportions for US flags, so the shape is different than what we use today. There are 31 stars on the flag (Kansas being the 31st) which meant it was good for only two years. 




